- 6.3. Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
  - 6.3.1. Curriculum Development:

The college is affiliated to Dibrugarh University. Therefore curriculum is developed by the University. Some teachers of the college are engaged by the University in the Curriculum Design and Development.

#### 6.3.2. Teaching and Learning:

The College provides quality education in various speciality courses in Commerce. The University prepares academic calendar at the beginning of each academic year and accordingly various departments of the College prepares teaching plans. The College conducts in-semester examinations, viva-voce, project works, etc. for the continuous evaluation of the students. Students are encouraged to participate in workshops, seminar, quiz competition and group discussion in order to improve their performances in internal assessment.

#### 6.3.3. Examination and Evaluation:

AQAR: 2015-16

University Examinations (End Semester Examinations) are conducted as per rules and guidelines provided by the Dibrugarh University (the affiliating university). The evaluation is carried out by teachers as per direction of the University. The college is identified by the University as one of the Examination Evaluation Zones and as such teachers are engaged in the Evaluation process. Two In-Semester Sessional examinations are conducted by the College. Internal assessment marks are awarded to the students based on their performance in their sessional examinations, group discussion, seminar, class attendance and viva voce.

#### 6.3.4. Research and Development:

The college encourages the faculty for research and development works with financial assistance from various funding and sponsoring agencies engaged for the purpose of higher education and research. The college also encourages the faculty to organise seminars / workshops, talks sponsored by UGC, NGOs, SEBI, etc.

#### 6.3.5. Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation:

Library: The college library has more than 26000 books and journals and is equipped with internet facility including ICT-OPAC

Physical infrastructure: The College was established long back with a three storied academic cum administrative buildings. Subsequently some addition to the infrastructure have been made in order to facilitate teaching and learning in a more efficient manner for meeting the ever growing demands and expectation of the students. The college has started both horizontal and vertical expansion of the existing building with the financial aid received from the Govt. of Assam.

#### 6.3.6. Human Resource Management:

The college grants leaves to the faculty members for participation in the refresher/ orientation programs, workshops, seminars etc for improving their knowledge base and professional skills.

#### 6.3.7. Faculty and Staff recruitment:

For the purpose of recruitment a selection committee is formed as per the guidelines of UGC and state govt. which selects suitable candidate and the proposal is placed in the Governing Body. After the approval of the Governing Body the proposal is sent to the Director of Higher Education for appointment

#### 6.3.8. Industry Interaction / Collaboration:

In the college campus industry interaction takes place in collaboration with industry, academic institutions. Expert from industry academic institute are periodically called to deliver special lecture and hold workshops on up-to-date market conditions, company offered job and internship.

#### **Best Practices**

#### **BEST PRACTICE - I**

- a) Title of the Best Practice: National Service Scheme (NSS)
- b) Objectives: The main objectives of this practice are -
- To understand the community in which they work.
- To understand themselves in relation to their community.
- To identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving.
- To develop among themselves a sense of social and civic responsibility.
- To utilize their knowledge in finding practical solutions to individuals and community problems.
- To acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude.
- To develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities.
- To gain skills in mobilizing community participation.
- c) The Context: Our NSS Unit had started its activities in the beginning of the academic session with the full support of our NSS volunteers under the leadership of Programme Officer. After looking into the students' community as a whole we found that many is very interested to involve themselves with some activities that eventually make them happy during their stay in the college and studentship. But in many cases they do not get any platform to do this, but NSS unit of this align the motto of the NSS "NOT ME BUT YOU" and the spirit of the students to do, learn and involve with activities. In this reporting year NSS Unit of the college started new future agenda for the college going youths by involving themselves as NSS Volunteers who do not have access to and control over their resources and escorting NSS Volunteers how to work with rural community people, generating awareness about the bed effect of Drug-Addicted, Alcoholism and prevention of AIDS, Malaria, Diarrhoea as epidemic, not to make panic during disasters like earthquake, flood etc. The Unit are also implemented the regular activities and adopted and prepared new activities like special camps in rural areas to develop education among rural poor youth.
- d) Evidence of Success: As a NSS Programme Officer I found that the education itself has practical importance in human society. To enjoy a life to-day no man can ignore practical exposure. Even one cannot imagine living a life without practical education. Theoretical knowledge is imperfect to create interest in knowing how the things we believe have been created, how they reach our mind, under what process it is transferred to our real life and the like. The field study help us in all these respects and mere class-room education, conventional examination cannot give oneself perfect knowledge of society as a humanity perspectives. After

field study one can learn for becoming self-reliant instead of queuing for job in Govt.
